January 26th Controversy across North Sydney Council

Tt looks like the North Sydney Council missed out on one of the more warming events of Australia Day, with a bizarre decision to completely dump the annual Citizenship Ceremony, moving the ceremony to January 24th.

A spokesperson from the North Sydney Council commented on the council's decision to move the ceremony date to January 24th

"Our January citizenship ceremony will take place on Wednesday, January 24th, in accordance with the Australian Citizenship Ceremonies Code, which was amended in James concluded.

"North Sydney Council takes great pride in collaborating with local schools and community members to welcome new citizens through our citizenship ceremonies. Our January ceremony will be as special and heartfelt for our new citizens as the 15 ceremonies held throughout the past year, where 1,654 new Australians have been welcomed. Like all our citizenship ceremonies, this event is for invited attendees only.

"We trust our new citizens will take the opportunity to celebrate and enjoy their Australia Day public holiday with family and friends."

Tim James has called upon the North Sydney Council to engage in open dialogue with Councillors and the community about why this ceremony has been cancelled.

"Our community deserves to have our traditions respected. Welcome to all our new citizens this Australia Day. Thank you for choosing to call Australia home," Mr





Density Changes Fight for Ku-ring-gai

here is only one urgent agenda for Kuring-gai. Inundate NSW Planning's portal with submissions. Get them in by the deadline, Friday 23 February.

Visit Ku-ring-gai Council's website www. krg.nsw.gov.au/Council/News-andnedia/Latest-news/Proposed-changes-to-NSW-housing-policy-and-its-impacts-on-Ku-ring-gaifor ideas.

Perhaps something like:

"I oppose the rezonings because I love my home and I don't want developers rapaciously knocking down my neighbours' houses, ripping out trees and beautiful gardens, blocking the streets with more cars and building poor quality housing that my children still can't afford to buy."

The NSW Planning's new 'Transport Oriented Development' (TOD) is jargon for 'destroy local amenity, heritage, tree canopy and environment and fill it with the sound of chainsaws and demolition trucks'. It is also code for 'smash the planning

system and rezone by stealth and give the developers everything they want'.

Where is the evidence for why the 400 metres around Roseville, Lindfield, Killara and Gordon Stations were chosen to become high rise 'Zetland' style streets? Where will the additional schools, parks, playgrounds, sports fields, public transport come from? What about infrastructure? Energy? Water pressure? Ageing sewerage infrastructure? Traffic congestion? When Ku-ringgai Council asked these questions NSW Planning declined to answer, obfuscating that it was "Cabinet in Confidence".

Yet the Minns NSW Government's proposals for dual occupancies, terrace house and 'manor houses' will have a far greater impact across Ku-ring-gai. No place is safe.

Prime Minister Albanese's hero Tom Uren visited Ku-ring-gai more than a decade ago and said: "You have something special here in Ku-ring-gai. Fight for it!"

Yes, fight for it. Send in your submission now.

f you're tired of hearing about the child's motion of no confidence in the Mayor.' play occurring at Ku-ring-gai Council, fear not – for so are we.

Before the close of 2023, Council held their monthly Ordinary Meeting on the 12th of December. Amid an agenda involving the removal of the park bench on Mariana Close in St Ives and dealing with a modification to the Development Application surrounding the North Turramurra Recreation Area, a noteworthy motion was brought forth by Councillor Spencer.

The motion called for a vote of no confidence in the sitting Mayor, Councillor Ngai. Cr Spencer argued that the reason for the motion was due to the behaviour of Mayor Ngai at a public forum held the week prior, on the 5th of December, and the Mayor's response following the aftermath.

'There was a departure from order at the last meeting,' said Cr Spencer during the Ordinary Meeting. 'Certain Councillors are concerned about your ability to chair this meeting and I've been asked to move this

After Councillors Jeff Pettett, Greg Taylor, Barbara Ward, and Martin Smith gave speeches on their opinion of the motion, Mayor Ngai gave his defence to the claims.

'When you become the mayor, the level of responsibility, especially with co-ordinating public meetings, steps up quite significantly,' said Mayor Ngai. 'I have actively sought opportunities to be trained in meeting practices... We do know there is a steep learning curve... Finally, I'd like to say that last week, although that was quite heated, quite passionate, I have seen much worse in previous Council meetings.'

Councillor Christine Kay interjected following Mayor Ngai's speech, asking if he felt it necessary to offer councillors and the public an apology for his conduct.

Cr Spencer continued to push the vote of no confidence, asserting that Mayor Ngai was not taking responsibility for the incident, and suggesting that Mayor Ngai



haphazardly contacted councillors in the middle of the night following the forum, 'I don't want to get in the middle of the night and see a lecture email from you for something that I did not do wrong.'

News

Cr Spencer criticised Mayor Ngai's need for "training", saying that Mayor Ngai should have been prepared for the nature of the position before taking the Mayoral seat. It is not unreasonable that the constituents of Ku-ring-gai expect a mayor who possesses the necessary skills to govern meetings and is ready for the role prior to volunteering themselves.

The Post has reached out to Mayor Sam Ngai for an interview. At the time of publication, The Post is still awaiting a response.

Council elections are to be held in September of this year. Hopefully Council can find their footing before it is too late.

The Mayor's Award for an Outstanding Contribution by a Community Group was presented to The Men's Kitchen. This service provides an opportunity for older people to attending monthly cooking sessions. By learning to cook good nutritious meals, members are able to remain in their homes for longer and if they are in a carer's role. they can better assist their partners and reduce the need for external support.

Ku-ring-gai's Environmental Citizen of the Year is Jemma Wlasichuk, a local small business owner who freely donates her time and expertise to bring resources and joy to the Ku-ring-gai local area. Her business Shed Eleven upcycles furniture for interior professionals, business, local government and the general public. She also holds workshops in creative reuse, the most recent being a mural for the Barra Brui Preschool using plastic bottle lids.

The Young Citizen of the Year is Kevin Hao. Kevin co-founded Youth 4 Difference, which is an innovative, student-led community organisation based in Ku-ring-gai. Youth 4 Difference regularly organises events such as bush care, beach clean-ups, tree plantings (such as at National Tree Day), park clean-ups and fundraising events with other charities, encouraging high-school students to play an active role in sustainability while serving the community and environment.

Ku-ring-gai's 2024 Citizen of the Year is Michele Bell. Michele joined the Ku-ring-gai Neighbourhood Centre (KNC) as a volunteer in March 2013. KNC is a not-for-profit community organisation assisting the elderly and disabled stay in their homes as long as possible with assistance as well as social interaction through group activities. Michele initially became the KNC's Manager and as the organisation expanded in 2019, the CEO.

This month Council is hosting a range of events to celebrate the start of the Year of the Dragon during our Lunar New Year festival. Celebrations begin on Saturday 10 January at Gordon Library, Art Centre, Wildflower Garden, St Ives Community Centre and St Ives Village Green. 

NAREMBURN VILLAGE

Council is forging ahead with the

Naremburn Village Upgrade which will provide easier access for pedestrians, cyclists, and bus passengers and enhance amenities to improve and extend visitation time to support local businesses. \$750,000 has been received from the Commonwealth Government to assist in funding the streetscape upgrade works.

Stakeholder and business engagement conducted earlier this year has been vital in driving the design development. Thank you to everyone who participated in our engagement activities. Final design documents and the tender process is now complete.

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

At its meeting on 27 November 2023, Council selected a 15% increase as its preferred rate rise option for 2024/25, which includes the NSW Government rate peg of 5%.

The proposed rate rise will allow Council to allocate an additional \$2 million a year in additional cleaning, care and beautification projects in parks, cycling and walking routes and town centres, and for tree planting and maintenance programs.

Council will now commence preparing a Special Rate Variation application to the NSW Government in line with the preferred rate rise. The application will need to be approved at a Council meeting scheduled for 30 January 2024, before being lodged with the NSW Government.

Council also voted to exhibit a revised Long Term Financial Plan 2023-2033 (LTFP) and Delivery Program 2022-26 which reflects this rate increase. I would like to thank members of our community that participated in the consultation process and provided valuable feedback to Council.

'Although the Department of Planning isn't seeking public consultation on some of its new policies, Council wanted to inform its residents of what the State Government is planning so they can be well informed,' says Mayor Ngai.



'Grandstand Showdown' as the bizarre NTRA Controversy Drags On

North Recreational Area (NTRA) has spectators are shielded from the elements. L recently become a hot topic among locals. Upgraded amenities and a fresh revamp for local sports teams seem like a win-win situation for everyone; however, some Ku-ring-gai residents have taken a staunch position against them.

The proposed development approval (DA) at NTRA is a massive improvement to the current facilities. With a 300-seat grandstand, partnered with a corporate box, media box, and boardroom for community use. Fit with adequate changing rooms, referee, official and coach change rooms. For spectators, adequate shade for parents and grandparents from the sun and a reprieve from a wet and slippery hill

Turramurra in the winter. Either way, all year-round

Northern Suburbs Football Association CEO Kevin Johnson commented on the development.

"The NSFA is paying for all construction costs, capital repairs and ongoing maintenance costs. The project won't cost ratepayers anything; however, the NSFA intends to share the new facility with the community.

"We're also happy to share it with other sports and community groups, and we expect it will be more in demand for school carnivals, which will be attracted by the undercover seating and additional amenities. We are the only football association in Sydney that doesn't have a home clubhouse, and the community will be getting a fabulous community asset at no cost to

ratepayers."

Kevin Johnson further commented on the plus for female athletes.

"It also enables us to increase the number of female-friendly change rooms massively. Many women currently don't have much space to change and are forced to change in car parks, this development will help change that."

This would mean that the NTRA would be able to acquire a tiny 'state-of-the-art' sliver of what other sporting and recreational areas, like Cromer Park, which hosts the Manly United men's and women's football teams, have at their disposal.

But of course, there is always a barrage of concerns with any development, and the local community has repeatedly complained about traffic and parking concerns if the development goes ahead.

However, independent traffic and parking planning investigated the site and found that no appreciable change in traffic was expected during peak times, as playing fields remain the same and the competitions are already at capacity. Careful planning and scheduling of junior and senior games outside of the golf course times will also prevent parking congestion.

Bushfire dangers have also been mentioned despite the grandstand's primary users, the NSFA, playing their games outside bushfire season.

Some residents have even gone so far as to call it a 'Stadium' or an 'Arena'. But let's be real, it's not like we're talking about a grand sports colosseum with tens of thousands of

seats of capacity. This grandstand has been unnecessarily blown out of proportion by residents in what can only be described as a last-ditch effort to stop the DA.

More recently, the council held an extraordinary council meeting on January 23rd, with the matter of the NTRA grandstand at the helm of what was a somewhat brief discussion.

A rescission notice was put forward by Councillors Cedric Spencer, Christine Kay and Greg Taylor to overturn the decision to build the grandstand.

The same three councillors voted down or abstained from voting on Norman Griffiths's oval redevelopment, and the same councillors who voted down a much-loved community bench in St Ives last month.

Voices of Ku-ring-gai Spy on Neighbours with "Tree Watch Movement"

The initiative encourages tree lovers to join the movement and keep an eye on the trees in the surrounding area and educate their neighbours.

> Members can purchase a plaque to display at their residence which reads, 'TREE WATCH WE'RE KEEPING WATCH OVER THE TREES IN THIS STREET". VOK hopes to monitor illegal tree removal, pruning or poisoning that has contributed to the overall canopy loss in the area. Members are added into a WhatsApp group with like-minded tree lovers to support each other.

Despite the supposed good intentions of the Tree Watch initiative, it is relevant

to note that the idea of monitoring your fellow neighbours may not foster a healthy community. Tree Watch is dangerously close to nearing authoritarianism with their encouragement of spying, nevermind righteous by promoting knocking on the doors of neighbours to inform them of the ecology of their property.

In an article posted on the VOK site, written by Grayling Road West Pymble resident Sandra Shergill, she writes, 'Why should the pursuit of someone's "dream home" come at the expense of the collective heritage and tranquillity of our community?'

Perhaps another question may be, 'why should the pursuit of protecting tree canopy coverage come at the expense of communitv trust?'



Sydneysiders Doubt **North Sydney**

> **Olympic Pool** Completion

With work on the site beginning in March of 2021, the redevelopment project has been continuously pushed back and has run over budget. As The Post reported last year, North Sydney Council commissioned an independent review of the project by consultants PricewaterhouseCoopers. The review found that Council did not adequately manage risks associated with the project delivery, that the budget would be extended as a result of poor decision-making and management.

Even though work began in early 2021, redevelopment of the North Sydney Olympic Pool was approved by Council in July of 2013. Since, consultations, development application submissions, expressions of interest, and detailed design documents have filtered in and out of Council concerning this pool redevelopment. Ten years of planning and approval processes have left Sydneysiders here, in January of 2024, awaiting the completion.

After the independent review, the updated date of completion was April 2024. Completion is now being advertised as the vague period of "mid-2024", however locals are sceptical whether this is likely.

In community groups on Facebook, the redevelopment has become a laughingstock. Facebook users are commenting that the pool should never have been touched, and jokingly predicting that locals will be enjoying the pool for December 2034

Features of the redevelopment include upgrades to the existing 50metre and 25metre pools, a kids waterplay area, a new warm water pool for gentle exercise, an expanded gym, a larger creche, a grandstand holding almost 1000 persons, ramp access to the pools, and accessible change rooms.

North Sydney Olympic Pool's reopening was first promised for the summer of 2022, then assured for the summer of 2023, but will most likely not be enjoyed before summer in 2024 to 2025. Unfortunately for the locals of North Sydney, they have waited three years, in the heat, for a project with a dubious end

On the 28th of February to the 3rd of March, "As Beautiful as a Bullet" by Charlotte Bourilly showcases forgotten female bushrangers, their disturbing and beautiful nature, and their refusal to be aligned with sexual stereotypes. The exhibition will feature a series of events with space jazz, groove-based improv, and post-future beats performed by Cone of Confusion, Almost Toast, and DJ Makeda.

From the 7th to the 17th of March, "Luminosity of Spirit", an exhibition by award-winning contemporary artist Catriona Pollard features woven sculptures to access the spirit within nature. Catriona uses the basketry technique with forged vines and recycled metal wire to create sculptural works. A workshop by Catriona to learn basketry is available while the exhibition is running.

From the 20th to the 31st of March, "Stunning", an exhibition by the Northern Beaches Gallery will display the works of 30 Northern Beaches artists. These works explore the beauty of the local natural ocean environment.

At the tail end of 2023, Northern Beaches Council launched a summer beach safety campaign to combat the number of drownings and reckless activity. Most drownings are occurring at unpatrolled locations or unpatrolled times.


Surf Life Saving are urging swimmers to stay safe, swim between the flags, and have a plan in place when swimming in unpatrolled locations.

Playing it Safe: NSW Government Program Provides Funding for Defibrillators in **Disadvantaged Sports Clubs**

THE NSW Government is providing \$500,000 in funding to sports facilities across the state.

News

A new program designed to install life-saving defibrillators at local sports facilities, making strides to create a more health-conscious community.

Eligible sporting organisations can apply for grants of up to \$3,000 to purchase automated external defibrillators. To qualify for the program, applicants must identify the location where the AED will be kept. This location should be in one of the postcode areas listed in Appendix C of the Local Sport Defibrillator Program Guidelines, the bottom five SEIFA locations.

Minister for Sports Steve Kamper commented on the new funding program.

"Sport is a great leveller, and the that people participating in sport in the State's most disadvantaged areas have access to this life-saving equipment.

"The first few minutes following a cardiac arrest are critical and access to a defibrillator can mean the difference between life and death."

The program is available for sport and recreation clubs, associations and organisations, councils, and service clubs in the State's lowest five socio-economic areas, as per the Australian Bureau of Statistics data.

Key objectives of the Local Sport

Defibrillator Grant Program 2023/24 are to support local sports and recreational clubs or related incorporated organisations located in the most disadvantaged areas of NSW in purchasing an AED package and to promote more comprehensive access to these devices across NSW.

Professor Jamie Vandenberg, Co-deputy Director of the Victor Chang Cardiac Research Institute, said "Sudden cardiac death is rare, but it can strike anyone at any time, and when it does, every minute counts.

"If you have a sudden cardiac arrest outside of hospital, you only have a one in 10 chance of survival.

"Defibrillators save lives; we need more across NSW and in as many sporting clubs as possible.

Eligible applicants for the program include incorporated not-for-profit clubs, associations or organisations in NSW that NSW Government wants to ensure are sport or recreation-related, state or national sport or recreation organisations on behalf of member clubs in NSW, licensed sporting or recreation clubs, sports clubs associated with a school, church, or university and service clubs such as Rotary, Country Women's Association, and Lions, can apply on behalf of sport or recreation clubs

Are Business Coaches Worth It?

perating a business of any size capital management, innovation/product is challenging. A business is a system of many disciplines that must effectively interact to create and satisfy customers to provide a satisfactory return to all stakeholders.

A growing trend is for businesspeople to retain the services of a Business Coach (BC) that they hope will enable them to better perform their function and hence improve the performance of the business. The question is "Do Business Coaches add value and are they worth engaging?" There is no simple answer to this question so here are some considerations that will enable you to arrive at an informed decision should you be considering the services of a Business Coach (BC).

Considering a BC indicates that you believe you have areas of improvement that need to be addressed [and don't we all?]. Before deciding to talk to a BC, write a Self-Assessment that includes a Balanced Score Card review of the health of the business (financial, customer oriented, processes, people/ learning & development) and analysis of your capabilities as they apply to the business.

For example, assess your capabilities of leadership, strategy definition, execution (getting things done), business planning that includes effective structure, marketing and sales, financial understanding, human

development, customer service, effective 'canned' process to be 'certified' as a BC so use of technology, etc. Write a list with the headings that matter to your business and to you, then score yourself (out of 10) objectively against each area. If possible, have a trusted 3rd party review it with you to uncover your 'blind spots'. Once you have completed this analysis, you can identify the areas that you and the business need assistance with and decide if a BC is needed.

Assuming you decide that a BC is needed, you can use the analysis to focus on finding a BC that has demonstrated capability in the areas where you need the most assistance. To identify a suitable BC, look for ones that have personal successful experience in those areas and who have demonstrated successful coaching of others that had similar circumstances to you.

There are different types of BCs:

BCs that offer personal coaching vet have little experience in facing and overcoming the areas that you must address. Whilst it is good that they can build your self-confidence and offer you advice on personal aspects, it is difficult for them to discuss methods for you to succeed because they do not have the experience or knowledge to work with you at a deeper level.

BCs that offer coaching on narrow subject areas, such as finance or marketing, where they have demonstrated experience and success, but they lack the background to assist you with the business in its entirety.

BCs who have been through a that they can use a slick marketing/sales program to gain clients, then apply a 'one size fits all' approach that they bought from their franchisor. Every business situation is unique and requires the leaders of the business to creatively drive it, and where necessary, seek expert advice to assist them to address the requirements. Such a 'one size fits all approach' is unlikely to be valuable.

The answer to 'Are BC's worth it?' is a qualified 'Yes'. Provided you have done your self-assessment and have a clear idea of the type of BC that you require, you will be able to identify an appropriate BC, agree the frame of engagement with them, then work together to formulate plans and actions that you will execute under the coaching of your appropriately qualified BC. One last point: be sure that you retain a BC that you like to work with as a person. The 'Staff Sergent' approach might seem good on TV shows, but in reality, no one wants to work with an overbearing BC.

nendigo Bank customers and members from different community groups have taken the Bank's "Banking Safely Online" sessions.

Since its launch in September 2023, over a thousand participants have been trained on how to better navigate digital banking, and how to protect themselves online. Banking Safely Online sessions have been held across the country totalling 109 sessions, with 89 more sessions to come in the months ahead.

The program consists of face-to-face digital literacy education. The 30-minute classes highlight the benefits of being digital, while warning participants of the high likelihood of scams and fraud, and teaching how to avoid these experiences to grow digitally capable and confident.

'The popularity of these sessions proves just how important the hands-on approach is for many of our customers,' says Head of Fraud Prevention at Bendigo Bank, Jason Gordon. 'We all know about the growing prevalence of financial crime... Which is why we've seen so many people want to better educate themselves... We want all our customers to feel supported and safe online '

Response from customers has been reported as overly positive, with participants leaving sessions claiming they feel more educated and saying they would recommend the Bank's sessions to friends, family, and other community groups.

'We know that one in four Australians are digitally excluded with older people, people with disability, low-income families and First Nations people at higher risk, not to mention those living in remote and regional

areas,' says General Manager of Digital Banking at the Bank, Nick Carter. 'While these sessions help our customers to stay safe online, they also help build confidence using digital applications, helping us bridge the digital divide.'

In order to maximise cyber-safety, Benidgo Bank have employed a number of measures, including multi-factor authentication, blocking high risk cryptocurrency transactions, increasing the size of the fraud prevention and response team, removal of links in SMS messages from the Bank, a security team monitoring suspicious activity, and unusual account activity detection.

Bendigo Bank recommends following ScamWatch's advice:

"STOP - Don't give money or personal information to anyone if unsure

THINK - Ask yourself could the message or call be fake?

PROTECT - Act quickly if something feels wrong"

Sue Heins, the exhibition is a unique and collaborative project that engages neurodivergent people in artmaking and discussions about caring for the environment.

New Laws for **Statutory Declarations**

ost of us need to use Statutory Declarations from time to time for legal purposes not related to court proceedings. Statutory Declarations are legal documents allowing a person to declare something to be true for the purpose of satisfying a legal requirement where no other evidence is available. It is a criminal offence to declare false information.

Examples of the usefulness of Statutory Declarations are proving a change of name, or proving that a person was or was not in a particular place at a particular time, or asserting other facts relevant to the legal matter in question. Evidentiary documents can be attached to statutory declarations, such as a marriage certificate to prove a change of name.

Justices or the Peace (JP) are free duly authorised officers that witness Statutory Declarations. JPs are widely available throughout the community, such as in public libraries, police stations and some shopping centres.

New laws and new approved forms for signing Commonwealth Statutory Declarations apply from 1 January 2024. They can now be signed in the following ways:

Traditionally, in person as a paper-based interaction signed and witnessed in the presence of a JP or other authorised officer;

Electronically, through an elec-2. tronic signature and remote witnessing via audio-visual communication link; or

Digitally verified, through the use 3. of the myGov platform which authenticates the declarant's digital identity through myGov. This option does not need a witness.

Statutory Declarations should be written to comply with the requirements of the authority to which they are being submitted.



around 55,500 receiving an ATAR, and the rest completing a vocational qualification.

'I know students and their families will be celebrating the culmination of many years of dedication and effort,' said Deputy Premier and Minister for Education and Early Learning, Prue Car. Over 1,400 students were recognised as "All Round Achievers", and over 18,000 earned a spot on the "Distinguished Achievers" list.


