A Special Day to B Kinder

In 2018, the b kinder foundation launched their b kinder day, an initiative to have schools, organisations, businesses, and communities take part in being kinder. The day connects people together, empowers children to make a difference, and discusses the importance of thoughtfulness and empathy.

The b kinder foundation was set up in honour of Billie Kinder, a young 12-year-old girl who lost her life in a tragic horse-riding accident. Described as having a heart for giving and a gift with words, Billie's legacy lives on in the kindness others give and receive.

On b kinder day, schools are encouraged to purchase one of Billie's b kinder cards, and have the students write or draw a message to someone they care about, either taking the cards home to parents or posting them. The b kinder cards feature Billie's artworks, her paintings and drawings, and her written quotes from poetry she created.

Supporting children emotionally and socially is a focus for the b kinder foundation.







The charity offers workbooks for school aged-children that follows the Syllabus for the Australian Curriculum: PDHPE K-6, honing in on health, well-being, and relationships.

'Billie's impact continues to amaze me. She once wrote: I know I am only 12, but I believe I can make a difference,' says Danny Mayson-Kinder, Billie Kinder's mother.

For b kinder day, the charity asks organisations and businesses to decorate their place of business with posters and balloons, and write their own messages on b kinder cards for those they care for. Acts of kindness, like donating to people in need or helping a stranger, are encouraged on b kinder day.

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Northern Beaches Council **Possible** Demerger

orthern Beaches Council are considering data for a possible demerger. During Council's monthly meeting in April, Councillor Miranda Korzy moved a motion to hold a Poll at the September Local Government Elections to judge community support for de-amalgamation.

'Council set up to serve 250,000 residents across more than 25,000 hectares,' says Simon Dunn, President of Protect Pittwater at the April meeting's public forum, describing the merger as a flawed policy. 'No matter how hard you work, you cannot be across every important issue.'

In December of 2015, former Liberal Premier Mike Baird proposed an upheaval of New South Wales' councils, where over 40 councils would be reduced to 19.

Warringah Council, using Section 218F of the Local Government Act 1993, proposed the merger of Warringah, Manly, and Pittwater. The Local Government Boundaries Commission issued a report to the Minister for Local Government, Paul Toole, which stated that the proposal met all the needed requirements.

The former Councils of Pittwater, Manly, and Warringah were amalgamated on the 12th of May, 2016. Together, they became known as Northern Beaches Council. Estimated financial savings of the merger, according to the KPMG analysis, would be \$136 million over 20 years.

The NSW Parliament put forth a new bill in February of 2024 to provide local councils with a pathway to demerge.

The forced amalgamation of NSW councils was a failed and expensive experiment,' says current Minister for Local Government, Ron Hoenig. 'It's essential that local democracy is enshrined in the decision-making process so that councils and communities are fully informed of the financial and other implications of de-amalgamation.'

After debate, Councillor Korzy's April motion was amended to see Council receive an urgent report of the primary desktop analysis of financial realities in de-amalgamation. The report is to be considered at the June Ordinary Meeting, where Council can then resolve on the implementation of

Councillors Grattan, Korzy, Heins, Menano-Pires, and Regan were against the amended motion. The motion was carried.

'There is a vocal group within the community advocating for a demerger. However, I do not believe that is the general view of Pittwater residents,' says Councillor Michael Gencher of the Pittwater Ward in a comment to The Post. 'I believe that conducting a poll on whether to demerge the Northern Beaches Council would be beneficial... The decision should not be taken lightly and must be informed by thorough analysis and community consultation.'

De-amalgamation must be conducted within 10 years of Council's merger. Whether a Poll to survey residents will be included in the upcoming elections is still pending.

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Climate 200 Are Changing Politics Teal

limate 200 is propelling climate-minded community Independents into Federal politics.

Climate 200 is a crowd-funded initiative that supports and funds promising community Independent campaigns and candidates. During the 2019 Federal Election season, Climate 200 was formed out of growing concern with political integrity, female representation, and the state of climate policies.

At their "Doing Politics Differently" event at the beginning of May, Climate 200 discussed their plan to continue broadening the landscape of Australian politics by helping elect Independents that represent their constituents.

'Rather than changing politicians' minds, the community would rather change politicians,' said Byron Fay, Executive Director of Climate 200.

During the 2022 Election, efforts by donors and volunteers saw Liberal safe seats across the country turn Teal.

Kylea Tink was elected as the Member for North Sydney, Sophie Scamps became the Member for Mackellar, and Nicolette Boele cut the Bradfield Liberal margin down to 4.2 per cent.

The "Doing Politics Differently" event held a panel with Kylea Tink, Nicolette Boele, and Katerina Gaita, a community organiser who was instrumental in setting up Voices of Goldstein. The panel spoke of the

importance and value of organising, and their experiences becoming the chosen candidates.

Climate 200 and Nicolette Boele are steadfast in the run for the Bradfield seat in the upcoming election.

'[The] community is looking for something different, looking for an alternative,' said Byron Fay. 'This is ground zero. Bradfield is the main place where there is opportunity.'

Climate 200 have launched their Community Accelerator Matching Fund.

Any donations by the public will be doubled in support of Independent campaigns. In celebration of his 94th birthday, Adelaide local David Donaldson announced his donation of \$94,000, asking the community to come together to match the donation.

Climate 200 have now raised over \$100,000 through their Community Accelerator Fund.

The Post, recently spoke to Jack, who has been door-knocking throughout Wahroonga, getting to know the locals.

"Surprisingly, there is no negative feed-back about what I'm trying to do, some negative feedback about the (Ku-ring-gai) council and how things are operating. Many people wouldn't even be able to name their current counsellors because there's no real interaction from them, compared to state or federal politics."

Jack often heard that he was the first political person to door-knock locals' houses to get to know them.

He attended local schools, played for a number of community sports clubs, and currently works as a Senior Adviser while managing a small business. "I identified that the current Council struggles with collaboration with residents.

24-25 Budget Underwhelms

any Australians will be looking forward to some cost of living relief in the coming weeks, with the Federal Government's new \$300 energy rebate and Stage 3 tax cuts coming into play from 1 July.

The energy rebate is one of a number of sugar hits in a Federal Budget that was full of nice headlines. There certainly are many households that are currently doing it tough and would benefit from a lower energy bill.

At the same time, a \$300 rebate for every Australian household regardless of whether they earn several million dollars a year or are getting by on a pension will cost taxpayers a total of \$3.5 billion.

Surely this money could have been better targeted, or even redirected towards long-term solutions like helping households invest in solar and batteries, so they need not rely on expensive fossil fuels.

Ultimately, despite the surplus, I found the Budget 24-25 underwhelming: full of headlines but lacking the leadership and reform needed to address our housing, climate, intergenerational equity, and domestic violence crises.

In the lead up to the budget, I consulted with community groups, peak bodies and local councils, and took their views to the Treasurer and ministers of the climate change, transport, health, employment and social services portfolios.

I remain as always committed to working with the Government, my colleagues in Parliament, and all in our community towards the progress we want to see.

Where to From Here with the Minns Government Transport-Oriented Development

any of us have been following Kuring-gai Council's opposition to the proposed Transport-Oriented Development (TOD) in the area.

This topic is widely discussed within the community, and I'm often asked for my opinion on how it will unfold, especially now that Ku-ring-gai Council is taking legal action against the State Government.

In early May, Ku-ring-gai Council informed the community that they had called for more consultation and infrastructure investment in areas affected by the NSW Government's transport-oriented development plans.

Within Ku-ring-gai, the TOD planning controls apply to areas around Roseville, Lindfield, Killara and Gordon railway stations.

Mayor Sam Ngai has pointed out that the fundamental concerns regarding infrastructure, urban tree canopy, and heritage remain unaddressed. Numerous extraordinary Council meetings have been convened to discuss the TOD issue, but the community is yet to see any alternative proposed by this Council.

Mayor Sam Ngai has claimed that "future residents are getting ripped off" by the Minns Government. While he openly criticizes the government, he also urges them to adopt an inclusive and consultative approach, seemingly unaware that you attract more flies with honey than vinegar.

On Monday 20 May 2024, there was a Parliamentary Hearing by the Upper House at which Mayor Tanya Taylor from Willoughby City Council and Mayor Sam Ngai were in attendance. Mayor Ngai was asked how much Ku-ring-gai Council had spent on the full-page newspaper advertisements opposing the TODs. He refused to provide cost expenditure in running the full-page advertisements, called on the residents to "WAKE UP", and was accused of being 'evasive' during the inquiry.

The Post has recently enquired as to a cost estimate that ratepayers are bearing for the media campaign in opposing the TODs. Mayor Ngai has been asked to come back to the Committee with evidence of expenditure and when this is publicly available, The Post will share this information.

Mayor Tanya Taylor also spoke about the potential impact of the TODs in the neighbouring LGA of Ku-ring-gai. In June 2023, Willoughby City Council rezoned to accommodate an additional 6,500 dwellings in areas close to transport and amenity and all within a small LGA of only 23 square kilometres.

"Whilst the stations identified in the TOD program are not located specifically within the Willoughby LGA, areas around Roseville and Crows Nest station's TODs extend into Willoughby so, naturally, community interest is high. This is particularly evident in areas such as Naremburn, where there are concerns about impacts on important heritage areas," stated Mayor Taylor.

Interestingly, Steven Head, General Manager of Hornsby Shire Council also attended the Parliamentary Hearing on 20 May and did so on behalf of NSROC (the Northern Sydney Region of Councils – 8 local Councils presenting a united voice on key issues, representing Hornsby, Hunters Hill, Ku-ring-gai, Lane Cove, Mosman, North Sydney, Ryde and Willoughby).

Mr Head acknowledged the housing crisis and went on to share concerns about how the blanket one-size-fits all reforms fall short especially in regard to environmental considerations such as bushfire, flood, biodiversity, heritage matters and crucially – waste management.


Mr Head called for State Government to "calibrate the settings for each individual location". During the meeting, Mr Head stated that from a Hornsby Shire Council perspective, "I'd say that we've been quite satisfied with the collaborative nature of engagement from departmental officers... we've had opportunity to approach the Minister on a number of occasions and have a worthwhile discussion there."

I believe that Hornsby's position on the TOD's reflects the good governance of the Hornsby Shire Council in planning for increased dwellings in their Master Plan as have Willoughby City Council.

My read on Ku-ring-gai's legal action is that should the State Government relent and allow them the same 12 months afforded to other Councils to do the planning work required, perhaps the legal action may not go ahead which would certainly be in the best interests of the ratepayers of Ku-ring-gai.

Perhaps Ku-ring-gai could take some lessons from Willoughby and Hornsby Councils in how to plan for the future and work with the State Government.

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

From the Mayor



With community we resolved to involve young people in future policy decisions by establishing a Youth Advisory Committee. We also asked staff to improve the online accessibility of our public forums while maintaining process integrity for all involved.

With the environment we resolved for additional measures aimed at increasing urban tree canopy, as well as targeted activities to enhance the longevity and usage of our natural turf sporting fields.

In light of revised population projections for the railway corridor, we are also revisiting the demand and feasibility of our open spaces, community facilities, and library projects at Turramurra, Gordon, and Lindfield as well as an arts and cultural centre in Marian Street Killara.

At Ku-ring-gai we are keen to provide our future population with the lifestyle they deserve, but this can only be achieved with proper urban planning and appropriate infrastructure funding.

It is for this very reason that we have commenced legal action against the NSW Government.

Despite being one of the first councils to proactively engage the State Government under part 2 of its the Transport Oriented Development program, the state has not afforded Ku-ring-gai the same terms given to Labor-led councils.

Ku-ring-gai continues to plan for population uplift but does so at a significant financial penalty. The decision to go to court is not taken lightly but is supported by legal advice and in the event of a win, ratepayers stand to save over ten million in infrastructure costs caused by the rushed implementation.

Ku-ring-gai has some great events this month as part of the Gai-mariagal Festival. Activities include a screening of Lionel Rose, an art exhibition featuring the work of Darkinjung artist Judith Franklin, dot painting classes, culinary displays, and musical and cultural storytelling.

Igniting Local Live Music

NORTHERN Beaches Council is partnering with the Live Music Office and the Australasian Performing Right Association and Australiasian Mechanical Copyright Owners Society. Together, Council is hoping to uplift the local live music scene across the Beaches with a new Live and Local program.

Live and Local is a 12-month program which will see Council connect a network of local musicians, relevant industry professionals, and venues to develop opportunities for live events and local musicians. These include bands, DJS, and other music businesses.

As part of the program, Council are hosting a live music forum to discuss strategy and organise live events.

Motorists See Points Returned

MOTORISTS in the Davidson electorate are reaping the reward of their safe driving through the NSW Government's demerit point return trial.

Data broken down by local government area (LGA) shows 23,198 drivers in Kuring-gai have seen a demerit point removed from their licence for maintaining a 12-month spotless driving record.

More than 1.2 million drivers qualified for the demerit point reward for maintaining a clear record during the initial 12-month period up to 16th January 2024.

The demerit return trial has been extended for a second year as the NSW Government continues to sharpen its focus on road safety in 2024 amid a rising road toll.

Labor MLC for Davidson, Greg Donnelly said earning the removal of a demerit point can mean a lot, especially to motorists who rely on their cars to drive the kids to school or to get to work.

"It is great to see drivers rewarded for their safe driving. Our community knows how important road safety is and this program is driving that message home.

Kelly Loveridge will commence her appointment to Northern Beaches in late June of 2024.

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

Federal Budget -What it Means for Bradfield

he Albanese Labor Government's third Budget was a missed opportunity and failed to address a host of challenges impacting households in Bradfield and beyond.

Like other Australian families, Bradfield families have endured a cost of living crisis, with energy prices, mortgages and grocery bills all up.

Food is up 10 per cent, housing is up 12 per cent, and electricity is up 18 per cent.

This Budget brings Labor's extra spending to\$315 billion, which will worsen inflation.

The average Australian household with a mortgage is now \$35,000 worse off.

The Budget does deliver some important and worthwhile initiatives, such as \$3.4 billion to add life changing and life saving medicines to PBS, and \$1 billion towards accommodation for women and children fleeing domestic violence.

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Concerning Cuts Made to Northern Beaches Hospital

The future is looking bleak for Northern Beaches Hospital.

Northern Beaches Hospital is under a Private Public Partnership (PPP), where company Healthscope operates and maintains the hospital. According to the PPP between the NSW Government and Healthscope, the hospital is to provide public patient services until 2038.

Healthscope dropped the value of the business by almost \$1billion following losses up to December 2023. As a result, serious doubts have been expressed over whether the public-private hospital can continue running with the amount of debt Healthscope have accrued.

Healthscope recently announced cuts to the maternity and mental health services at Northern Beaches Hospital. Reducing staff, cutting back on full-time nurses, and reorganising shifts are among the changes. Healthscope claim that the changes will not lead to an erosion of patient care and will not compromise on the quality of NBH's service.

The imminent cuts have caused a stir within the community.

'The decision to reduce staffing levels amidst ongoing systemic issues at the hospital is alarming,' says Michael Regan, Member for Wakehurst, in a recent statement. 'Healthscope and the hospital management need to reverse these proposed cuts. They must prioritise the well-being of both patients and staff.'

Both Michael Regan and Dr Sophie Scamps, Member for Mackellar, have written to NSW Minister for Health, Ryan Park, expressing their and their constituents' concerns. More directly, Member Scamps is displeased with the operation structure of Northern Beaches Hospital, maintaining that privatising the service has disadvantaged the public.

I am deeply worried about whether Northern Beaches Hospital, which is run as private-public partnership, is delivering the standard of care that my constituents should legitimately expect,' says Member Scamps. 'It is not acceptable that the 350,000 people who live in the Northern Beaches and surrounds should have a lesser service because of the ownership structure of the hospital.'

Serious requests for the NSW Auditor General's performance audit of the hospital to be fast-tracked have been made by both Member Regan and Member Scamps.

Update on The High School Dilemma in Hornsby Shire

'n our April edition we featured a story about families struggling to find adequate schooling options for Hornsby Shire children.

You may recall many residents took to various social media pages venting their frustration and confusion over the lack of transparency and action by Local Member for Hornsby, Matt Kean.

The Post has subsequently sought feedback from the NSW Government in relation to this matter. We have asked about the feasibility study we were advised was initiated approximately two years ago by Mr Keans' office. It's going to be of no surprise for you

to read now that in fact there was never a formal feasibility study undertaken. How puzzling!

At this time, we have not reached out to the Member for Hornsby for comment. The reason for this is that his office was unable to assit with any of our enquires over the past two years in relation to this matter. However, we have received feedback from the NSW Department of Education.

A spokesperson has stated "The NSW Department of Education has consulted the local community to understand what it wants from its local high schools and ensure we're providing the right schooling options for a growing population in the Hornsby-Berowra area.

This consultation gave the community a chance to voice opinions on existing co-educational and single-sex options.

We have had a tremendous amount of interest, with sold-out workshops and more than 4000 responses.

The consultation was completed on May 10 and the department is currently reviewing results."

The Post will stay in close contact with the NSW Department of Education to bring you the information that the Local Member for Hornsby appears unable to deliver for his constituents.

Ku-ring-gai Council Seeking Community Feedback

KU-RING-GAI Council is seeking community feedback on a plan to create a new park in Dumaresq Street Gordon.

The Council purchased three neighbouring properties in Dumaresq Street to create a park as part of its award-winning open space acquisition policy.

The policy seeks to create parks and playgrounds for Ku-ring-gai residents in areas of high population density.

When built, the park at 9 Dumaresq Street will provide a new green space for residents and workers in Gordon close to local shops and services.

The new park will have level grassed areas and access will be improved by removing fencing and installing a pathway from Dumaresq Street. The park will also be landscaped and have seating and litter bins, with existing mature trees retained.

A draft concept plan is on public exhibition for comment until 12 June.

Mayor Sam Ngai said the park would ultimately be a welcome addition to central Gordon.

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Don't Hold Your Breath Waiting for the Sydney Olympic Pool

o no one's surprise, redevelopment at Sydney Olympic Pool is again delayed.

North Sydney Council's upgrades to the site began in March of 2021, with an original estimated completion date of November 2022. Though, Sydneysiders missed enjoying the summer heat in the promised pool as the project's completion date moved to April 2023.

After the realities and issues of taking on such a large-scale project began to rear its head, North Sydney Council charged private consultants PricewaterhouseCoopers to conduct an independent review.

The review found that decisions made by Council, as not hiring external project managers, not managing risks throughout the project, and incorrectly factoring elements like equipment into the budget, left a compounded, negative effect. The result is, essentially, continuous delays.

'The renovation of North Sydney Pool is a prime example of how not to do an infrastructure project,' says Kylea Tink, Federal Member for North Sydney. 'The problems with this project started when the former Scott Morrison Liberal government threw \$10 million in pork-barrelled cash at the project ahead of the 2019 election in a bid to retain the federal seat of North Sydney.'

Member Tink continues, 'The community deserves better and it's time for all parties involved in this to publicly communicate a plan for re-opening the North Sydney Pool before the end of the year.'

North Sydney Council had altered the completion date to "mid-2024" - ever vague and malleable. Locals who have continued to question when, if ever, Sydney Olympic Pool will be opened will be thrilled to know that the completion date has been moved again.

Sydneysiders, get your swimmers ready for late 2024 to early 2025.

HORNSBY Shire Council has announced that entries for the Hornsby Art Prize are open from Monday 3 June.

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Talks of New Northern Beaches Council Aboriginal Advisory Committee

ayor Sue Heins moved a Mayoral Minute to further engage with the Northern Beaches Indigenous community.

During the April Ordinary Meeting, Mayor Heins spoke on having the Northern Beaches Council Chief Executive Officer produce a report on establishing an Aboriginal Community Advisory Group.

The Group would consider culturally appropriate protocols, projects and activities such as naming land and public art, and the Council's Reconciliation Action Plan, the formal commitment to reconciliation.

'Council can tie itself up and waste resources in trying to communicate with various clans who live here,' says Mayor Sue Heins. 'It is simply about the cultural significance of our local Aboriginal history. This is not the Voice.'

When asked by Councillor Vincent De Luca whether an Aboriginal Advisory Group would have any decision-making ability, the CEO outlined that Council would need to consider the abilities of the advisory committee at a later date following the report.

An Advisory Committee, as outlined by Mayor Heins, would need to be separate from the Championing Diversity – Multicultural Inclusion Plan 2029 that was adopted by Council. The advisory committee would be involved in sensitive Indigenous issues.

The report is set to highlight the responsibilities of the Metropolitan Local Aboriginal Land Council and the Aboriginal Heritage Office. The Aboriginal Advisory Committee would, in effect, correspond with those established organisations and produce further meaningful consultation.

'It's primarily for Council to make sure when we're having to vote on things, we've already had an Aboriginal overview on whether it is culturally appropriate or not, and that it is inclusive of different points of view,' explains Mayor Heins.

The Mayoral Minute for a report was carried 8 to 6. Those for included councillors Glanville, Grattan, Bingham, Korzy, Heins, De Luca, Robins, and Regan.

The report will be given to Council within three months.

New Metro for Crows Nest

CROWS NEST was buzzing on Sunday 26 May as the community had the chance to visit the new Crows Nest Metro Station for an Open Day.

Member for Willoughby Tim James said over seven thousand people turned out to view the soon to be completed station, a testament to the excitement that is building locally.

"The Sydney Metro is a game-changing investment in our public transport that will transform how we move across Sydney and it's coming to Crows Nest very soon," Mr James said.

"With two stations in the Willoughby electorate at Crows Nest and Chatswood, the Sydney Metro will greatly improve local connectivity, providing direct access to the CBD and beyond, with a trip from Crows Nest to Martin Place taking only seven minutes."

The Sydney Metro City and Sydenham line will open mid-year, extending the existing line from Chatswood to Tallawong in North-West Sydney that opened in 2019.

"Travel from Chatswood will also be transformed with a trip on the Metro from Chatswood to Gadigal (near Town Hall) taking 13 minutes compared to the current 23 minutes to Town Hall using Sydney Trains."

"This is a visionary project that will change our lives for the better and there's not long to wait now," Mr James concluded.

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Winner of the 2024 Remagine Art Prize Revealed

THE Remagine Art Prize for 2024 has announced its victor, as Lane Cove's own artist, Phoebe Stone, secures the top accolade with her oil and pastel masterpiece, "Serene Sea," earning her a \$5,000 reward. Stone found inspiration during a stroll along Sydney's Berry Island Reserve's Gadyan track, where her gaze wandered from the native foliage to a looming oil tanker.

"Its hull was faded black and rusty red in hue. The irony of the name of the tanker 'Serene Sea' really struck me. An oil tanker, serenity? A 'Serene Sea'? As I walked on, I couldn't help but muse that this might be a plea from the workers of the ship; a serene sea, a safe passage home," said Stone.

"Yet as thoughts about excessive consumption, endless industries devouring fossil fuels, rising temperatures and sea levels swam around my head, I realised, this isn't just their plea, it's ours too. If we aren't careful and if we do not keep our seas serene, in a relatively short space of time, no one will be able to walk this track."

The annual Remagine Art Prize, a collaborative effort between Hornsby

Shire Council and Hornsby Art Society, challenges artists to confront the crisis of waste and overconsumption through their creations. This year's theme, "Crossroads of Consumption," urged participants to explore how individual choices impact global sustainability.

Chris Gleisner, hailing from Mascot, received the Highly Commended title and a \$2,500 prize for her poignant artwork, "The Sixth Extinction: A Short-List."

James Birch, a talented artist from Mount Ku-ring-gai, clinched the Local Artist Award and \$1,000 for his piece, "SCRAPS." Meanwhile, Coco X Huang, a resident of Waitara, secured the Youth Award and \$1,000 for her mixed media creation, "In a Drop of Water...".

Hornsby Shire Mayor, the Honourable Philip Ruddock AO, commended the finalists for their dedication to environmental advocacy.

"These artists have expressed their passion for sustainability and the environment through each of these unique, thought-provoking works".

I'm continuing to call out the appalling handling of housing affordability by the State and Federal Governments.

In 2020, nationwide servicing of an average new mortgage for a home required 30.3 per cent of your income. By October last year, that had risen to 49.5 per cent. In Sydney, that amount is 72.2 per cent.

In other words, if you live in Sydney and you're on an average income and want to live in an average house, then it will require \$3 in every \$4 you earn. That's impossible.

There are two things we must do. Firstly, we must temper population growth. Sydney's housing is not keeping pace with the number of new arrivals. I'm an enthusiastic supporter of migration and a multicultural Australia, but, in 2022-2023, net overseas migration contributed 174,000 people to New South Wales, the bulk of them in Sydney. So demand is too strong, and the housing market's out of kilter.

Secondly, we must responsibly increase the housing supply. It's a social and economic necessity, but it must be done in a way that works with local communities.

I'm deeply concerned about the new planning regime that's been put in place by the Minns Labor government. They want to remove the say that local communities have on how we increase housing supply.

I believe community inputs will always make developments better. The Minns Labor government's topdown approach to densities will strip local communities of their autonomy.

I support more housing, I support sensible local housing targets and I support investments in local infrastructure, but it all must be done in partnership with local communities.

We all must work in partnership in tackling this vital challenge for the future of our area and our country.

Wiloughby's "Canopy of Life Tree Festival" Launches

PROTECTION of tree canopy across Sydney has become of great importance to local councils.

In an effort to inspire local residents to care and learn about tree canopy protection, Willoughby City Council launched the Canopy of Life Tree Festival on the 29th of May.

As the first of its kind for the Willoughby LGA, the Festival will consist of a programme of free workshops and talks, speaking on the necessity of eco-consciousness, providing valuable information on topics such as tree identification and forest bathing, while offering advice of how to manage trees on private property. Families are encouraged to participate in interactive bushwalks as part of the programme.

Since 2011, Willoughby's tree canopy in residential areas has reduced by 13 hectares. By inspiring residents and providing opportunities for learning through this event, Willoughby City Council are hoping to secure the future well-being of tree canopy.

'We need every Willoughby resident to understand and appreciate the hugely important role that trees play in sustaining the planet and human life,' said Willoughby City Council Mayor Tanya Taylor, in her launch speech on the 29th of May at the Incinerator Café.

'6,000 years ago, the region's trees were vital to the Gammerayal people,' continued Mayor Taylor. 'Fast forward to today and very little has changed... the community's reliance on trees has expanded, given the ever-increasing need for their role in cleaning the air we breathe, and providing habitat and food for many endangered native species.

The Canopy of Life Tree Festival was coordinated by the Environment Education team at Willoughby City Council, following council's commitment to the "Love Your Trees" campaign. Mayor Tanya Taylor announced that in the coming financial year, Willoughby City Council are investing an additional \$2million in public maintenance and canopy management.

Highlights of the Festival include the "Conversations on Trees" Symposium at the Chatswood Library on the 5TH of June, with keynote speaker Greg Mullins, former fire chief and climate activist.

In partnership with the Environmental Club at Willoughby Girls High School, Council, staff and students have developed two new walking "Tree Trails". Students selected trees to be incorporated on the trails, with information about the trees and their environmental impacts accessible for residents along the route.

'Each and every resident has a civic responsibility to think about the greater good,' said Mayor Taylor. 'As a united local community, we can preserve Willoughby's environment for future generations to enjoy, and play our part in tackling the global climate emergency.'

Beaches Council Information Sessions for Low and Mid Rise Housing Reforms

NORTHERN Beaches Council is organising information sessions for keen residents regarding the NSW government's proposed housing height and density increases on the Northern Beaches.

The Council has urged the government to abandon the proposals, citing concerns about their potential long-term environmental and social impacts on the local area.

Mayor Sue Heins invites local residents to attend these sessions to gain insight into how the proposals could affect them personally.

"While we recognise the need to address Sydney's housing crisis, we oppose the blanket approach to housing density," Mayor Heins stated. "This could result in inappropriate developments in unsuitable locations and undermine Council's ability to plan effectively for growth."

She highlighted potential consequences such as increased strain on infrastructure, including roads and public transport, and potential loss of green spaces and heritage protections.

Residents are encouraged to register for these sessions to understand the proposals' implications and explore potential courses of action.

Council Planning staff will conduct sessions in each of the five Council wards. The events are free, but registration is mandatory. Details for the sessions are available on the Council website, they are Monday 3 June, 6 - 7 pm at Manly Seniors Main Hall, Cromer and; Thursday 6 June at Newport community Centre Main Hall.

Small Business and the Federal Budget 2024-25

■ mall Business will be impacted by the Federal Budget 2024-25 well beyond the specific items targeted for Small Business in the Budget.

The Budget Overview document (www. budget.gov.au) lists \$641.4m in small business initiatives:

- Improving Cash Flow, by extending the \$20,000 instant asset write-off for a further 12 months.
- Easing Cost pressures Administrative burden through \$365 energy rebates to approx. 1m small businesses; abolishing 457 "nuisance tariffs"; and \$10m additional support to small business employers administering the Paid Parental leave scheme.
- Supporting confidence and resilience in the small business sector through allocation of \$41.7m over 4 years for:
- Supporting the Payment Times Reporting Regulator (\$25.3m over 4 yrs.).
- Providing financial counselling and mental health support for small business owners (\$10.8m over 2 yrs.).
- Implementing the Government's response to the Review of Franchising Code of Conduct (\$3.0m over 2 yrs.).
- Supporting unrepresented small businesses through the Australian Small Business and Family Enterprise Ombudsman (\$2.6m over 4yrs.).

Whilst these initiatives offer some benefits at the operational level, they do not offer 'hand outs' for small businesses that will ensure them viably in the current economic conditions. Provided the Budget addresses inflation and eases cost of living pressures, the tough conditions may improve somewhat but as always, the health of small businesses will depend on their ability to find profitable opportunities and deploy strategies to effectively compete.

According to the Budget overview, "Inflation is the primary focus of the Budget in the near term". The focus is on 'responsible economic management' to return another relatively modest (\$9.3 billion) surplus.

Small businesses may benefit by focusing to take advantage of the initiatives that the Government is taking to:

- "Ease cost of living pressures.
- Build more homes for Australians.
- Investing in a Future Made in Australia.
- Strengthening Medicare and the care economy.
- Broadening opportunity and advancing equality."

To take advantage of the Government's stated initiatives, small business needs to look for the market opportunities that the 'Initiatives' create in their industry sector.

The initiatives to ease cost of living such as tax cuts, energy bill relief, waiving a proportion of student debt, increasing rent assistance to nearly 1 million households, and enabling some cheaper medicines have the potential to enable more discretionary spending across all sectors with small businesses that make themselves attractive to customers ahead of their competition.

97.5% of Australian Businesses are Small Businesses, with half of these being in 4 streams: Construction (18%); Professional, Scientific and Technical Services (13%); Rental, Hiring, and Real Estate (11%); and

Transport, Postal, and Warehousing (8%).

The focus on building more homes and infrastructure offers significant opportunity for the 18% of small businesses in Construction and the other industries that offer services to that sector. Similarly, the focus on renewable energy and higher education reform creates opportunities for small businesses, as does the initiatives in the Care sector. The canny small businessperson will analyse the Budget to look for opportunities in their sector, then devise strategies to capitalise on them.

In summary, the 2024-25 Budget provides some positive indicators that economic conditions will ease; however, small businesspeople need to tailor their strategies to take advantage of targeted opportunities that it may create whilst ensuring their businesses are operating as efficiently as possible in what will most likely still be tough circumstances.

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




equipment. [Lendecon] is trying to improve the utilisation of what we already have.'As a Renewable Energy Engineer, Dylan is interested in sustainability, and after taking a short course at Stanford in the United States, and seeing how quickly businesses scale with software, decided that software may be his way of implementing change.

'I was cleaning out my garage and I noticed just how much stuff I had accumulated and I connected all the dots,' says Dylan.

Lendecon, though is in its early days, has available items in categories such as tools, camping, leisure, party, events, and sports. Members of Lendecon can upload their items to be rented out, with a small fee, and browse items in their local area.

Through this, members can borrow items from neighbours they may have

With increasing pressure on existing areas and notable shortages in places like St Leonards and Crows Nest, I am advocating for more innovative sites like the public park over the railway corri-dor in St Leonards. We should explore similar solutions, such as constructing a green roof over the Warringah Freeway, to further expand our green space. I am committed to advocating for thoughtful and innovative investments in greenspaces throughout Willoughby.

I will continue to hold this government to account and work to ensure that our local sports clubs, facilities and green spaces receive the funding they need to help more of our people enjoy the physical, social and mental benefits of sports.

Vinnies' Sleep Out Shines a Light on Homelessness

Participants raise funds for homelessness and spread awareness of the realities of rough sleeping. Though only for a night, the experience is eye opening and allows communities to understand and connect with their homeless members, while raising crucial funds.

Vinnies encourages community groups, schools, businesses, and leaders to host and participate in a nearby Community Sleep Out. Donations and sponsors for registered teams and CEOs help to end the battle of homelessness. St Leo's Catholic College Wahroonga students are participating in St Vincent De Paul's annual Community Sleep Out.

Chresten Brix Neilsen is a student at St Leo's Wahroonga, and President

of St Vincent de Paul Society at the school. This is Chresten's third year involved with the Vinnies Community Sleep Out.

'This year especially, as President... planning it out and participating has become quite close to me,' explains Chresten. For last year's Sleep Out, Chresten was able to personally raise over \$500 for homelessness, with St Leo's Catholic College Wahroonga collectively raising over \$35,000 for the cause.

'Homeless and domestic abuse victims... what we are especially funding is getting money to those people so they can rent a motel for a week while they get themselves sorted,' says Chresten. 'There is going to be 100 [participants]. We are all sleeping out on the green.'

With the money raised by these annual Sleep Outs, St Vincent de Paul has been able to assist nearly 2 million struggling Australians. In 2023, the Vinnies Sleep Out reached over \$8.9 million in available funds.

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Valuing Your Property

Por most of us our home is our most valuable asset. Knowing what it's worth can open doors to wealth creation through the equity held in the home.

There are various ways of valuing property. Online estimates can create a general insight without reference to the peculiarities of the property, such as its state of repair. Estate agents are not qualified valuers but have experience in current market trends with reference to other recent sales. They provide market appraisals and do not charge a fee. Certified Practising Valuers are registered, qualified professionals that assess the value of properties. They do charge a fee and are required to provide extensive written valuation reports.

Formal property valuations from Certified

Practising Valuers may be required in circumstances such as:

- When banks need to assess the value of a property being used as security for lending purposes or to obtain mortgage insurance.
- Stamp duty assessment on property transfers that are not subject to a contract for sale or transfers that are not considered as being "at arms-length" transactions.
- Family law proceedings where the asset pool of the parties is being considered by the Court.
- Personal financial agreements relating to property such as inter-family loans or private business loans.

- Building insurance valuations to ensure properties are adequately insured.
- When undertaking rent reviews to ensure they are fair and reasonable between landlord and tenant.

Property valuations fluctuate with the economy, and should be reviewed regularly. Most formal valuations are valid for 12 to 18 months, depending on their purpose.

Davidson MP Matt Cross Encourages Blood Donations After Bowel Cancer Diagnosis

lmost 300 Australians a week are diagnosed with Bowel Cancer. Over 100 die each week from the devastating disease.

Bowel Cancer is the second deadliest cancer, only behind lung cancer, with an estimated 5,300 deaths yearly. If found early, 99% of cases can be treated successfully, however fewer than 50% of Australians are diagnosed in the early stages.

June is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month. For the month, advocacy, funding, awareness and calls for research are at the forefront to aid in the cure and care of Australians living with the disease.

Bowel Cancer Australia's annual Red Apple Day, an initiative to raise funds for early onset bowel cancer research, falls on the 19th of June. Any donations made on the 19th of June will be matched by Bowel Cancer Australia's matching partners, meaning any money raised is doubled.

Bowel Cancer touches many Australians and their families.

At the beginning of May, Member for Davidson Matt Cross bravely announced in a speech to the New South Wales Parliament his own recent diagnosis with bowel cancer. In his speech, Matt spoke of how his cancer was able to be caught early thanks to his regular blood donations, which caught irregularities.

'Cancer affects everyone in our society, whether you are diagnosed or a colleague, friend, or loved one is diagnosed,' says Matt Cross in his speech to Parliament on the 7th of May. 'It does not discriminate.'

Matt Cross MP encourages others to

consider becoming an Australian Red Cross Lifeblood donor, as each donation can help save three lives. 'My recent visit will help save my life. My blood was given a voice & alerted me to danger,' he writes in a post to Facebook.

World Blood Donor Day falls on the 14th of June. Lifeblood host a National Blood Donor Week to recognise and celebrate donors.

Albanese Commits Extra Funding to Ending Gendered Violence

ver thirty women have died at the hands of their partners in the first four months of this year.

Across Australia, one woman was killed every 11 days by an intimate partner between 2022-23. The Albanese Government has declared this a national crisis.

To fight this epidemic, the Government has committed to investing \$925.2 million over five years to establish the Leaving Violence Program for women and children experiencing domestic violence. This builds on the Albanese Government's \$2.3 billion in measures to end intimate partner violence.

The Leaving Violence Program is an initiative supporting the National Plan to End Violence Against Women and Children 2022-32.

The Program aims to improve the safety and independence of victims by offering individualised financial support packages of \$1,500 in cash and \$3,500 in goods and services. Payments will be indexed to compare to cost-of-living in the coming years.

'Financial insecurity is a major contributing factor in a woman's decision to leave, stay in or return

to a violent relationship,' reads the Women's Budget Statement 2024-25, signed by Katy Gallagher, Minister for Women, and Treasurer Jim Chalmers MP.

On the 29th of April, members of the crossbench including Kylea Tink, Member for North Sydney, Zali Stegall, Member for Warringah, and Sophie Scamps, Member for Mackellar, sent a letter to the Prime Minister calling for action.

'Violence against women is preventable, but we need to better identify risks and

opportunities for intervention,' the April letter reads.

The crossbench letter addresses the need for funding frontline services as a tangible opportunity to end gendered violence.



'Frontline services live hand to mouth, constantly worrying about whether their funding will be renewed,' says the letter. 'The federal government must force the states to

break the logiam on the recruitment of 500 frontline workers funded in last year's Budget.'

UTI Treatments Now in Community Pharmacies

If you've ever experienced the frustration of dealing with a urinary tract infection while facing delays in seeing a doctor—whether due to a weekend or the busy cold and flu season—there's good news: relief is now available!

Pharmacists across New South Wales can treat patients with uncomplicated urinary tract infections from the 1st of June.

Following a 12-month NSW pharmacy trial, pharmacists who have undergone the required training will be able to provide consultations and prescriptions for relevant medications. One thousand pharmacies participated in the trial, and more than 16,000 women benefitted from UTI treatments.

The NSW Government committed \$6 million, providing \$20 per patient to

compensate for pharmacy consultations.

'The NSW Government is committed to taking pressure off GPs and primary care services and we are constantly evaluating ways we can deliver healthcare more efficiently as well as safely,' says Minister for Health, Ryan Park. 'Enabling pharmacists to do more will mean many women will get timely access to the care they need.'

Women who are eligible for treatment at a participating pharmacy must be between the ages of 18-65, have symptoms consistent with an uncomplicated urinary tract infection, and have not had a urinary tract infection in the past, or are at a high risk for complications.

Further full clinical evaluations will continue to assess the NSW trial, looking at women were satisfied with the service, how



often antibiotics were given, and how women were guided to other medical services if needed.

'Women across New South Wales will benefit from easy access to treatment for painful UTIs,' says Pharmacy Guild of Australia NSW Branch President, David Heffernan. 'Pharmacists are ready to step up take some of the pressure off of GP clinics and hospitals.'

Pharmacists may soon be able to trat common skin conditions, such as dermatitis or school sores.
