Brown for Berowra

t is my absolute pleasure to announce to readers of The Post that I will be running for the seat of Berowra in the 2025 federal election.

I never thought that life would take me down the political path (surely there must be better candidates), but after several community members expressed their trust and potential support it got me thinking. I was reminded of veteran Independent Community politician Cathy McGowan's often repeated mantra, 'if not me, who, and if not now, when'. With that thought playing on my mind, I applied to and have been endorsed by community democracy group Voices of Berowra as their Community Independent Candidate for the forthcoming election.

As Publisher of The Post, over the last four years I have deeply immersed myself in our community and have felt the sting that so many Berowra residents are feeling. Representation for Berowra has been lacklustre, our local concerns being minimised, ignored, and forgotten. Since the electorate's inception in late 1969, the good people of

Berowra have re-elected Liberal members into our seat time and again, leading to us being taken for granted as a 'safe blue-ribbon seat'. To see real change, to have our voices matter, we must be brave enough to look for true representation across the issues that really concern us. That is why I believe that we need a dedicated community focused Independent in Canberra.

Growing up in Lane Cove and Naremburn, I moved to the Berowra electorate where I have been living for nearly 10 years. I have raised two stepsons, now in their thirties and living interstate with their own families. Here in Berowra, I raise my two teenage children, I run my small businesses in Thornleigh, and I enjoy our unique community, surrounded by our stunning bushland environment. I want to protect what our electorate values and

There is a balancing act between protecting our natural environment and allowing growth and opportunity, and the only way to have the desires of Berowra residents heard is for an Independent to be

Through my time as Publisher of The Post, I have been deeply moved by the grassroots efforts of many not-for-profits and charities. I am an active supporter of the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Women's Shelter, ensure that we are not exploited to meet and advocate for better domestic violence

funding and changes to our justice system. I have personally accompanied victims to court, witnessing the challenges they face, which underscores the urgent need for action in our Berowra electorate.

Mental health advocacy is another passion of mine, and I have openly supported the incredible work of Lifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury Sydney.

Our electorate's aging population raises concerns about elderly residents' access to support workers who can't continue to afford to live where they work. Cost-of-living and lack of affordable housing is not just a widespread issue, it has the potential the ruin the fabric of our great community. Prices are extraordinary and unacceptable at the check-outs, and it is the responsibility of your representatives to fight to relieve the financial vice tightening around each of our families.

Beneath all of these critical issues is the looming threat posed by the ongoing lack of serious climate action by either of the major parties. My viewpoint has been reinforced by early returns from Voices of Berowra's extensive community survey activities across recent months.

I accept the consensus from the vast majority of credible scientists that we require urgent market and non-market actions to limit our emissions and move quickly to a sustainable non-carbon future, in line with our international obligations and, importantly, common sense.

Moving forward, I will work to ensure a fair and balanced reporting of the forthcoming federal campaign in The Post. To that end, I have handed over my editorial responsibilities for the paper to a bright young woman, and for full transparency will highlight my position as a candidate in any articles that I might contribute.

Finally, I look forward to being of service to the people of Berowra, meeting and listening to even more of you out on the campaign trail ahead.

Protect Our Community: Dispose of Batteries Safely

and harmful impacts if we dispose of them incorrectly, according to Hornsby Shire Council. This includes AA or AAA batteries, button batteries, and lithium batteries, which are particularly dangerous.

Fires caused by batteries placed in household bins are unfortunately becoming more common with the increase of rechargeable devices, placing people and the environment at risk. Last year, discarded batteries sparked over 10,000 fires in Australia.

Batteries should never be placed in any of your household bins, as they can overheat and catch fire inside collection trucks or at

waste facilities. When they are exposed to the mechanical compaction in the back of collection trucks, combined with friction, heat, and other flammable material such as cardboard, this creates the perfect environment for fires.

Thankfully, it's easy to store and recycle batteries safely. When your battery is used up, place some clear tape over the terminals and store them in a cardboard box or container with air flow until you can drop them off at your nearest battery recycling point. Most household batteries can be recycled at the Thornleigh Community Recycling Centre and other accredited B-cycle drop off points, which include major supermarkets and retailers.

From Volunteer to Visionary:

Christine Kay Becomes Ku-ring-gai's Mayor with a Focus on Community and Collaboration

ailing originally from the Inner West, Christine Kay made her steady way over to Ku-ring-gai for the leafy green, as many do.

In the 2017 Local Government Elections, Christine first ran for Ku-ring-gai Council. Though unsuccessful, she persisted and put her hand up again in 2021, where the community elected her to represent the St Ives Ward.

Since, under the previous mayoralty of Councillor Sam Ngai, Christine served as Deputy Mayor. Now, after the 2024 elections and following an Extraordinary Meeting that swore the councillors in, Christine Kay was named Mayor of Ku-ring-gai Council.

Though the mayoralty was not a "northern star" for Mayor Kay, she finds the trust her fellow councillors have placed in her a privilege.

'Local government is not a stepping stone for me to go to state or federal [government]. I'm here to do the best that I can,' says

Mayor Kay. 'My emphasis this term is everyone being respectful of people's opinions. That's the beauty of Council as a whole, if we can bring out the skillsets that everybody has, we can do some amazing things.'

To Mayor Kay, the local community is her family.

She has entrenched herself in volunteer efforts, and

advocated for services to support mental health, youth suicide, domestic violence prevention, and disability. Mayor Kay sits as a committee member for the PCYC Hornsby Ku-ring-gai, has volunteered with the Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Women's Shelter, worked closely with Girl Guides and WildThings NSW, and is a Rotarian for the St Ives Rotary. At the same time, Mayor Kay is an elected board member on the Local Government NSW committee, and is a member of the Northern Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils (NSROC).

Making volunteering attractive to young people is a quiet goal for her time as Mayor.

'Volunteers are gold, we're got to treat them like royalty,' says Mayor Kay. 'If you find something that is an interest area for you, then you volunteer into that area. That's how I picked some of the volunteer groups I've picked something I am passionate about.'

Mayor Kay is hoping to aid in the fight against domestic and family violence. After three years, she was able to get the Status Women's Advisory Committee up and running, and would like to host more forums about advocacy and safety.

A key issue over the next term is housing. Ku-ring-gai Council under Sam Ngai controversially engaged the Minns' Government in legal action over the TOD policies. Council recently resolved to allow the community to give feedback on a list of scenarios for housing, and Mayor Kay finds this the best solution to tackling new housing policy.

'Council voted to oppose the blanket approach to new housing near the railway stations,' explains Mayor Kay. 'Let the community decide the outcomes. You'll have different views from people that live in apartments, people that live in houses... we need to get the balance right.'

Councillor Christine Kay will serve as mayor for a period of two years.

We are currently talking to our community about a new longterm plan that reflects what residents would like to see happen in Ku-ring-gai over the next decade.

The Community Strategic Plan is developed in consultation with the community and guides the Council's priorities, budgeting and planning.

The first stage of community consultation is taking place now until 11 December. Go to krg.nsw.gov.au/haveyoursay to make a comment or fill out a survey.

There will be other opportunities for residents to have their say on the new Plan next year and I will keep you updated.

The Council has also launched an extensive community consultation program on one of the most pressing issues the Ku-ring-gai community has faced for many years.

Under the NSW Government's housing policy, Ku-ring-gai must provide 23,200 new homes in the next 15 years within 400-800 metres of Gordon, Killara, Lindfield and Roseville train stations.

To provide that number of homes, building heights will need to increase. The question for our community is by how much?

Widen New Line Road

During the Coalition's reign under Scott Morrison, the Federal Government secured \$10 million to commence a planning study and public consultation. As a State road, former members Matt Kean for Hornsby and Dominic Perrottet for Epping secured \$70million to widen New Line Road.

Consultation has been completed, and areas of concern were identified for congestion. These included the flow over Pyes Creek, the Shepherds Drive and County Drive roundabout, the Old Northern Road roundabout, and the intersection at

Planning is to be completed in mid 2025. To make matters worse for drivers, the Minns Government have not openly committed to the project. Local politicians banded together to demand the upgrades.

'People throughout the Berowra electorate have been calling for the upgrade of New

Line Road since before I was elected. By delaying this crucial project indefinitely, the Minns-Labor Government is letting down everyone who has fought for this project for almost 2 decades,' said Member for Berowra, Julian Leeser.

'Despite the desperate need, the new NSW Labor Government have yet to commit to upgrading New Line Road to make it fit for purpose for the existing population. They cannot only consider new developments in the area without also considering the required infrastructure,' said Hornsby Shire Councillor, Nathan Tilbury.

'I hate sitting in traffic on New Line Road. I will fight to ensure funding for New Line Road upgrades is finally delivered to ease local congestion. Labor has delayed this funding at a time when traffic and congestion is worse than ever before,' said Member for Hornsby, James Wallace during his run in the state by-election.

Whether the widening of New Line Road will ever occur is perpetually uncertain. If history is to indicate anything, with the constant request for upgrade, a wider New Line Road appears a bleak

More Council Chatter On Untouched Marian Street Theatre

uring their Ordinary Meeting on the 22nd of October, Ku-ring-gai Council's final item on the agenda was Marian Street Theatre. A motion was moved to receive and note the update report on the likely costs and timetable to develop the unused site.

Councillor Indu Balachandran proposed an amendment during the lengthy discussion to approve \$300,000 for the 2025/26 financial year budget for the construction of limited works on MST in order to preserve the development

'Cultural infrastructure is critical to healthy socially connected communities, and we know Ku-ring-gai is adapting to younger users, changing demographics, and a growing population,' said Cr Balachandran.

She went on to say, 'I read every facility

and cultural infrastructure paper and plan, 2018 CSP, our community strategic plan, identified that many of Ku-ring-gai's current facilities are not designed for the diverse need of the contemporary performance arts and interest.'

Ku-ring-gai Council have applied for a \$15 million Federal Government Infrastructure Grant under the Thriving Suburbs Program.

'To secure funds from external stakeholders, we have to be clear about our intent to actually make progress,' said Cr Balachandran, speaking to the pending grant approval.

Cr Balachandran's amendment was carried using Mayor Kay's casting vote.

Another amendment was put forth by Councillor Smith to err on the side of caution, saying that instead of investing \$300,000, that Council would instead give consideration to funding for works during budget deliberations for the 2025/26 budget at a later date.

'I trust the staff to do the right thing... it's not the staff, it's the councillors,' said Cr Smith. 'It's the councillors who are the problem because we get a change of heart, a change of position on Marian Street Theatre. We need time to think, there is no reason to make this decision now.'

Cr Smith's amendment was made into the original motion, which was carried

'We have a brand-new Council who want to be seen to be taking the necessary steps to ensure that the innovative redevelopment application is preserved and progressed,' says Marian Street Action Chair, Tony Bates. 'There has been a long and thorough period of community consultation. The DA has been approved. Let's all now work together and build it.'

Further update on Marian Street Theatre is pending until Council reconvene on the subject for the financial budget deliberations.



Let's Support Small Business this Christmas

NSW Liberal Leader Mark Speakman and I chatted with owners George and Anthony about how cost-of-living impacts their business. We went through all their expenses – rent, electricity, gas, employing staff and fresh produce. We then turned to government taxes and charges, including GST and workers' compensation premiums.

Small business are so much more than just paying bills. They are the backbone and heart of our local community. They provide services, employ people and create economic growth.

This Christmas, I encourage everyone to shop local and support our small businesses. Whether it be purchasing

presents, foods and drinks, or going out for a good time. They need and deserve our

Thankfully, we have a wide selection of small businesses to locally choose from, with almost 15,000 in Ku-ring-gai and over 32,000 in the Northern Beaches.

Each month the Small Business Commissioner releases a Momentum

The latest found the following from small businesses in NSW:

- 34% have plans to grow, alter or expand operations;
- 16% expect revenue to increase;
- 45% plan to expand and are looking to hire additional staff.

This gives us great hope - but there is still so much more work to do. 82% of small businesses indicated they were concerned about the cost of business inputs.

I have a few ideas worth considering.

For starters, we need to cut red tape that costs the Australian economy \$176 billion annually, according to the Institute of Public Affairs. Red tape reduction should include that for every new regulation, two regulations are repealed. Governments at all levels, persuasions and locations should also try to streamline processes and regulations to make it more simple to

Secondly, workers compensation premiums need to be reduced. In the last year, premiums increased 8%. icare needs to guarantee that every dollar raised from premiums is put towards supporting injured workers - not towards executive bonuses or travelling to Bermuda (yes, this actually happened in May 2023).

Finally, we need a dedicated champion as Minister for Small Business. They should hold portfolios that complement small business, such as Treasury, Finance or Fair Trading. Government has an important role to play, and it begins by listening and understanding small

The following notice is published pursuant to Section 104(4) of the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC Act).

The Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government proposes to adopt a plan for aviation airspace management for the Western Sydney International (Nancy-Bird Walton) Airport (WSI) within the meaning of section 160(2)(b) of the EPBC Act, located approximately 46 km west of Sydney's Centre in Badgerys Creek, New South Wales.

The proposed action has been assessed by Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The EIS has been finalised and is now published.

North Shore Councils Ranked Slowest for **Development Application Approvals**

Tilloughby City Council and North Sydney Council are in the bottom 10 for Development Application Approvals.

In a recent report by Sydney renovation firm Nouvelle, all Great Sydney Councils were averaged and ranked for their approval wait times for the 2023-2024 financial year.

Willoughby City Council ranked 30 out of 33 Councils, averaging 238 total days for approval. North Sydney Council fell shorter, ranking 32 out of 33 Councils with an average wait time of 266 days until approval.

These numbers appear even more troublesome compared to the number of applications lodged.

Crowned first for fastest approval time, Wollondilly Council's average wait time for approval was 61 days, with 517 applications lodged.

Willoughby City had far less applications lodged, at only 161, and North Sydney received only 115 applications, though their speed in assessing applications was slower.

Lane Cove Council ranked 4th, averaging 88 total days. Hornsby Shire Council was 5th, averaging 95 days. Northern Beaches Council was 8th, averaging 113 days. Ku-ring-gai Council was 21st, averaging 165 days.

'Councils that streamline their approval processes not only help homeowners achieve their dreams faster, but help them keep costs down by avoiding ever-rising material and trade costs,' says Mike Turner, Managing Director at Nouvelle. 'If DA approval is required for a project that includes an addition, demolition or a major change to the floor plan, they should allow longer - up to nine and half months' more if they live in an area like North Sydney or Georges River.'

Berowra Residents Seek Ways to Reduce Their **Bushfire Risk and Insurance Costs**

oices of Berowra held their first official live event on the 11th of November at Magpies Waitara.

For the free event, VoB invited industry leaders Greg Mullen and

Sharanjit Paddam to sit on a panel and discuss Bushfire Risk, Climate Inaction and Rising Insurance Premiums.

Well attended by the public, attendees asked questions about how they can move forward to lower their insurance, what can be done to reduce their fire risk around Berowra, and how the government should act.

Greg Mullens has more than 50 years' experience as a firefighter. Retiring as the Commissioner of Fire & Rescue NSW in January, Greg joined the rural fire brigade and fought fires during NSW's notorious Black Summer. He formed Emergency Leaders for Climate Action in 2019, a group of fire and emergency chiefs from every state that are concerned about extreme weather driven by climate change.

Sharanjit Paddam is an actuary, working in the UK and Australia. He has been awarded Insurance Leader of the Year 2022 by ANZIIF, Actuary of the Year

among the community, though insurers have since altered their approach to risk by specific address. As such, homeowners in the local region are finding it impossible to afford insurance.

'There are people with unaffordable insurance all over Australia, but it is concentrated in ... the Hawkesbury Nepean valley around Sydney,' explains Sharanjit.

Greg and Sharanjit touched on how the government can act, how they have failed to act in relation to Black Summer, and the hope moving forward with insurers. Allowing the purchase of properties which for decades had been identified as high risk has exacerbated the heartache when disaster strikes. Policies such as buy-backs by the government are a slow-moving process, so the panel implored attendees to actively mitigate their own risk, installing sprinklers and having a private certification done for insurers to consider when calculating

Ku-ring-gai Council Alternative **TOD Housing Scenarios**

u-ring-gai Council have released four alternative housing scenarios for Roseville, Lindfield, Killara, and Gordon stations. These scenarios are slated to deliver the same level of housing as the NSW Government's Transport Oriented Development (TOD) policy.

In an Extraordinary Meeting on the 30th of October, Council came together to vote to publicly exhibit the scenarios. Earlier in May, Council resolved to prepare these alternative scenarios and reconvene once completed.

Ku-ring-gai Council are seeking community consultation on the scenarios, which are available for feedback until the 17th of December 2024.

The first scenario is the existing NSW Government TODs, which allows for six storey apartment buildings within 400 metres of the aforementioned stations.

The first alternate scenario is Scenario 2a "Safeguard and Intensify". Under this scenario, 78% of Heritage Conversation Areas will be protected from apartment zonings. In some areas, the NSW Government TOD policies will be adhered to, though apartment buildings will be subject to new planning controls that ensure buildings are less dense than the NSW controls.

The stolen war honour roll at Turramurra Memorial Park has been replaced.

'The theft of the original roll was an appalling and disgraceful act,' says Ku-ringgai Mayor Christine Kay. 'Unfortunately, the original honour roll and the criminals who took it have not been found.'

As the right honour roll was not stolen, manufacturing a replica of the left involved a labour-intensive fabrication process to give the new roll an aged appearance.

Nowadays, Warrah offers supported independent living for adults across 13 homes with 24/7 care, community support services and in-home support. Along with that, Warrah is the only Steiner specialist school operating in Australia, providing K to12 education with 31 students currently enrolled. Warrah also operates a biodynamic farm and operates an organic farm lead an engaging and fulfilling life.

shop which I had the chance to learn more about on my visit. More recently, Warrah has assisted with the creation of microenterprises, including candles made by Rohan, who is a regular participator at the Dural Men's Shed. Ben and Jim have also started moving lawns with the assistance of the team at Warrah.

I'm excited about Warrah's plans to expand, open new learning opportunities and bring our community along the journey. Right now, I'm working on a plan to support them as they grow and continue to support people in our community to

Following the exhibition of the Galston Village Public Domain Plan, refinements have been made based on community feedback. 2024 Hornsby Westfield Hero Sian Gordon of The Burdekin Association

Taking home the title of Hornsby's 2024 Westfield Hero is Sian Gordon.

Winning the Westfield Hero Award allowed Sian to secure a grant of \$20,000 for the youth homelessness organisation she works for, The Burdekin Association.

Having lived and worked with young people in the United Kingdom, with foundations that housed youth with mental health and behavioural issues, Sian has directed her career to the betterment of young people.

After completing a counselling diploma on the back of her social work diploma from the UK, Sian secured a placement with Burdekin five years ago, and has been with the organisation since.

'I always wanted to work with young people and I know I've got that ability to connect with young people,' says Sian. 'I've got the ability to connect with them and I really enjoy seeing young people work hard

at Burdekin, use all the support they can get and then go on into independence.

Sian is a Team Leader, overseeing case managers who work face-to-face with young people. Her work involves applying for social housing, finding employment, supporting young people through study and apprenticeships, and keeping the team

'I supervise the team individually, making sure everyone is okay, because a lot of the time the work is exhausting, it can be quite challenging,' says Sian.

The Burdekin Association receive about 240 referrals a year, and have housed 50 young people this year with their 33 beds. Many of the people coming to Burdekin are sleeping rough, and almost all have had total relationship breakdowns within their

'It doesn't matter where you are from, who you are,' says Sian, 'It is down to mental health, but I think 99% of our young people are all from broken families.'

The Burdekin Association receive



The Burdekin Association Specialist Homelessness Services funding, but the Westfield Hero grant is a welcome hand.

'I won and it was a shock to be honest,' explains Sian appreciatively. 'We are doing driving lessons, money going towards formals. We've got one young lady going into hospital soon with severe endometriosis... we can pay her rent for a month. I was so pleased, it was such a huge boost for us.'

Managing Your Mood Group for Adolescents now in Hornsby!

ifeline Harbour to Hawkesbury Sydney (Lifeline H2HS) is now offering supportive groups for young people in Hornsby.

The Managing Your Mood Adolescent Groups are Dialectal Behavioural Therapy (DBT) informed skills groups for adolescents aged 14 to 18. These groups provide a safe space for young people to develop skills in managing difficult emotions. Participants will learn valuable techniques in mindfulness, emotional regulation, distress tolerance, and interpersonal effectiveness.

Held at two locations, sessions commence in February on Tuesdays 5-7pm in Brookvale and on Wednesdays 5-7pm in Hornsby. Each group module runs for 8 weeks.



Participants should live, work, or study in the Northern Sydney region. Before a place in the group can be confirmed, participants must have a PHN Mental Health Triage referral form plus a Mental Health Treatment Plan submitted by their GP to the PHN for processing.

Lifeline H2HS also runs Managing Your Mood groups for adults at Gordon and Seaforth, as well as for 18 to 25-yearolds at Chatswood.

Managing Your Mood is funded by Sydney North Primary Health Network.

MoWaNa and the **Northern Beaches Safe Space**

fter hours at The Mind Café in Narrabeen, the MoWaNa Safe Space welcomes the community

MoWaNa, which stands for Mona Vale, Warriewood, Narrabeen, is a place to "drop-in" at night, talk about your mental health problems, and find an attentive listening ear.

In November 2021, Mel Kypri created the MoWaNa Facebook page as a way to deal with the mental health gap in the public system. Driven by her own suicide attempt in July of 2021, Mel noticed that there was nowhere to go in the local neighbourhood when people were struggling with mental health issues.

'You talk to your parents, your family members, and they are quite judgemental only because they care so much,' explains Mel. 'I just wanted someone that I could just talk to and get it all out of my head. That's the problem, people can't get it out of their head and it festers.'

Since February of 2023, MoWaNa has been operating out of the Mind Cafe on Friday, Saturady and Sunday nights. Inside, MoWaNa volunteers have tea, coffee and biscuits available, board games and quiet activity, and present a safe space to chat. All volunteers have lived experience, either attempting



suicide themselves, having mental health problems, living in a domestic violence situation, or have close family and friends having experienced these issues. Volunteers are all trained in suicide prevention, mental health first aid, and take the Domestic Violence Active Bystander course.

'When someone walks in the door, one of us will greet them and ask them why they are there, take them aside, sit down with them, find out more about their story, and listen,' says Mel. 'To listen is the most important part.'

MoWaNa will often direct those who wander in on who to speak to, and what

services to contact, about their specific challenges.

Community members who visit MoWaNa vary in age, from young teens to the elderly. Often, Mel outlines, people come in between their formal mental health psychology, psychiatry, or counselling sessions to fill the gap.

On top of their drop in safe space, MoWaNa has "Coffee With Kindness" out of the Mind Café on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday mornings. Every Wednesday night during the school term, MoWaNa do "Wellness Wednesday" from the Tram Shed, where they host activities like Taichi, voga, sound healing, breath work, and practical philosophy, among

In January, MoWaNa received a \$50,000 grant from the State Government to train another 55 volunteers.

'That tells me the state government sees value in what we are doing,' says Mel. 'We want everyone to know on the Northern Beaches there is a safe space they can go. Doesn't matter if it's a kid running away from someone that wants to hurt them, or a women running from a domestic violence situation, we can lock the door and keep them safe. Every neighbourhood needs something that people can go to at night if they are in trouble.'

indfield Learning Village (LLV) has hit a historic milestone.

Since opening its doors in 2019 to their inaugural group of Year 7s, these students have entered into their final year of secondary study.

Lindfield Learning Village are guiding their first cohort through their HSC.

The Upper North Shore school was the answer to an alternative educational system. LLV concentrates on individualised learning, fluidity for students to learn at their appropriate level not their age, and for teaching to be collaborative and flexible.

This HSC cohort say that being a part of

the school's inception means they were able to shape their educational experience, and development LLV's unique environment.

'We participated in the formation of the school. We contributed to school rules, decided on uniform policies, and established technology zones,' says Maya, a Lindfield Learning Village HSC student.

Teachers would often ask for feedback on their practice, making the students feel they could take ownership of their education.

This milestone reflects an active pursuit for alternate education. The NSW Government in 2019 under the Coalition and Gladys Berejiklian spend over \$40 million renovating the school from the former University of Technology Sydney Ku-ring-gai campus.

In 2031, the other 'home grown' cohort, the students who commenced Kindergarten in 2019, will face their HSC and final secondary schooling year.



Will Kits No Substitute For A Good Yarn

ookie-cutter will templates are gaining traction for testators looking for economical will solutions. Will kits and online will platforms provide templates to be filled in, signed, and as the proverbial saying goes, "Bob's your uncle". But not so fast, says Bob.

Disclaimers, terms and conditions of online wills and will kits direct testators to seek advice. Touted legal reviews of online template wills are procedural rather than substantive in nature, failing to address the testator's personal circumstances and provide corresponding advice.

Absent an opportunity to fully discuss and analyse a testator's personal circumstances with a trusted and experienced legal professional, gaps or omissions may be left in wills that could have been better drafted. There is also the risk of undue influence for

Worthy of one on one exploration with a legal advisor are issues such as:

- Suitability of executors
- Provision for blended or estranged families
- Unrepaid family loans
- Overseas property

Valid wills must also be signed correctly, usually done at a lawyer's office with the correct prescribed witnesses. The devil is in the detail, and care must be taken when preparing wills.

Investing in obtaining in person legal advice ensures all angles of a testator's personal circumstances are covered and their wills do not contain unintended adverse consequences for executors to resolve that could easily have been addressed at the time of making the will.

There is no substitute for a good yarn.

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The Men's Table International Men's Day Event

nternational Men's Day was on the 19th of November.

For the day, The Men's Table hosted an event at NSW Parliament on Macquarie Street to speak about their work serving men and strengthening the care for men in our communities.

The Men's Table is a registered notfor-profit, beginning in 2011 with 12 men who came together for dinner and to connect. Since, every month the same men have met up to express the highs and lows in their lives. But it has grown from the first group.

Now, 22 Tables across Australia run monthly, with 2,351 regular men coming together.

In 2023, 2,419 men died by suicide, 2.5 times more than road deaths, with 1 out of 4 Australian men reporting

loneliness. The work of the Tables involves creating positive spaces for men to come and share, and break down their isolation and social disconnection to better themselves, and the relationships with others in their lives.

Recently, the Men's Table 2024 impact and insights report was released. According to their data, the number one reason (43%) that men join the Tables is because they are looking for friendship and connection.

'These issues of loneliness, superficial connection, family breakdown... they are all effecting the health and mental health of all men, and put a burden on those around them, and on the health system and on society,' says David Pointon, Co-Founder and CEO of The Men's Table. 'Under all this is a common thread: they don't have a safe space to share and talk about these challenges. And that's where we come in. The Men's Table goes beyond banter.'

'It is time we need to embrace AI,' explains Garima. 'Those who do not want to may not be in the job... you need to enhance your skills using AI so you can be up in your work. AI is here, we cannot escape from it.'

From day one, AI2Easy's mission was clear: "AI, simplified for you".

As AI2Easy continues to grow, Nikhil and Garima remain committed to their original vision. Their journey is far from over, and they're excited about the future possibilities in the world of AI.



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The Local Artists of Wisemans Ferry: The Ferry Artists Gallery

Back in 2000, a group of dedicated people lead by local artist, teacher and art biotecome. and art historian, Heather Winch, agreed to run an inaugural Wisemans Ferry Art Prize.

Home to roving waterways, famous national parks, and the state's oldest ferry crossing. Wisemans Ferry is a unique town. Though a fringe community, tucked away in the outskirts of Sydney, the valley is filled with local artists.

After the inaugural Wisemans Ferry Art Prize and its success, Heather and her group of like-minded friends thought it was well overdue for a community art

The Ferry Artists Gallery is a not-forprofit community-run gallery with a shop front on Old Northern Road, Wisemans

Inside, the work of local artists, ranging from painters, resin artists, jewellers, photographers, sculptors to potters, fibre artists, printmakers, calligraphers, and weavers, fills the gallery.

Members support the gallery, one day a month volunteering their time to work in the commercial shopfront. Most of the members are artists themselves, and with their membership, they can display their

At first being exclusively for Hawkesbury artists, the Gallery now welcomes members from all regions of Sydney, as long as they can complete a mandatory day's duty manning the shop.

'There is a great mix of people back here, a huge mix of economic diversity, and the artists are a part of that,' says Carol Gill, President of Ferry Artists Incorporated and local artist. 'The artists are the ones that find it hard to earn a living... to have a gallery, a community, that sells your art locally is a godsent to local artists.'

Along with servicing the artists, Wisemans residents have the opportunity to buy pieces of artwork without the effort of a trek closer to Sydney.

Open daily, Ferry Artists Galley holds four exhibitions throughout the year. In February, they showcase the local art at a discounted piece, to clear out the studio for a new year. In May and July, there are themed exhibitions for the public to browse.

On the 9th of November, the Gallery opened their newest exhibition in time for Christmas "Ferry Artists Presents!" which will run until January. At the opening, Mayor of Hornsby Shire Council, Warren Waddell, and Mayor of Hawkesbury City Council, Les Sheather, were in attendance.

'Locals want a beautiful gift for somebody... they know they only have to drive into Wisemans. They love it because they are supporting local people. It's a big deal out here, supporting local people,' says

The members of the Gallery have started a new venture, known as "River Sketchers". Open to anyone, the casual get-together is an opportunity for the public to come, bring out their drawing materials, with a drink and sandwich in hand, and draw and paint the landscape. River Sketchers have set up in St Albans, the Canoelands Orchard, and the rock shore overlooking the Hawkesbury.

'We all sat around one day complaining that we don't get outside to draw enough," explains Carol. We are looking forward to that continuing, and looking forward to more people joining us.'




